


## Festival of Motorsports. ACSMC Motor Sport Promotion Day. Thruxton, 15th September.

fully paid-up members of HBRO. The trial scores for the two days will be added to make an overall score. Teams will comprise 2 drivers in sinale vehicles or one doubledriven vehicle and the event will consist of sixteen sections over the 2 days.

CAMPING:- Site opens on the 6th to Monday the 9th. Fee £3 per niaht.

#### RULES:-

- 1) This is a two-person-team event. Competitors must enter in ARC specification Vehicles and produce an ARC log-book.

## All Rover Weekend - Gaydon 1996

Big mouth job again. Let me explain. I wasn't sure if I was going to attend the West Wycombe Off Road Show or go to the ARC "All Rover Weekend" at Gaydon this year. At an ARC meeting, Chris Savidge of the 101 club was asking if anyone had a big barbecue that the 101 club could borrow as they were celebrating 21 years of 101s this year and were offering to run a grand barbecue for a lot of people. The 101 having been officially "born" In 1975 is now 21 years old. I tentatively offered the HBRO's ones pending committee clearance to do so. Yes that's OK says the HBRO committee. Hmmm... It looks as though I'm going to have to take it there too so I've got to go! Moreover, my own 101 is from the first year of production so it's 21 too, so I'm duty bound to go - no actually I want to go. Bad news is that the barbecues are at Nelly's Dell - somewhere in the undergrowtn (!) not having been used for a while. Ashley, ever generous, says he'll have a look for them next time he's there as he knows the farm well. Not only does he sort this lot out for me but he brings it all to Alan's yard for me to pick up when I can. I can't thank him enough. Next HBRO committee meeting enables me to collect the stuff without having to make a special trip. The two half-drum support bases fit inside the half-drum troughs and the whole lot only takes the space of a single whole drum. Clever that, Don't forget the grilles though!

I started out early on Saturday morning and arrived at Gaydon about 9:30 and pitched my tent in the camping field opposite the Heritage Trust entrance. I dropped off the BBQ stuff in the arena and handed over the ARC flag to be flown on Nick Kay's magnificent 15 metre pneumatic mast. Quite an impressive piece of kit.

I then drove over the road to the museum and put my car on display. Free entry to everything going if you display your vehicle. Already loads of 101s and other Land Rovers, Range Rovers, Rover saloons, etc. parked in the hot sun. Former HBRO member Hugh Glossop was there with his latest acquisition which is a very very rare 4-door Range Rover which he basically rescued from being scrapped. The vehicle was in a poor state so Hugh got it for only a few hundred pounds. It pre-dates the Monteverdi 4-door model by ten years. Built by PanelCraft, it's really rather a lash-up. The front doors are shortened by being cut and shut with shortened class to suit and closing against repositioned 'B'pillars. The rear doors are made from front ones much chopped and changed with the skins reversed and the 'C'-pillars made of modified 'B'-pillars and angled back the same way. The rear side sliding windows have been shortened and fitted to the rear doors. The front seats are Recaro items very crudely welded in place and the whole interior trimmed in a fairly dark brown, including the headlining. Quite a sombre image to the interior. The original exterior colour was apparently some horrid metallic bronzy type hue with chrome bumpers and chrome Rostyle wheels. Combine this with the ugly conversion and I'm surprised they sold at all. The huge amount of work needed to achieve the whole

conversion nigh-on doubled the cost of the vehicle. Most went for export. There are only two confirmed in existence in England and this is one of them. Quite a find. There's a respectable collection of other vehicles, mostly Monteverdi Range Rovers. A few other "real" Land Rovers and several very tasty saloon cars made up a good show on behalf of the ARC.

Lunched with Hugh and others in the museum. Very good and a reasonable price too. Hugh is full of his "find" and I'm not surprised. If he really does justice to the restoration, it's going to cost him a lot of pocket money. It's one of those rare vehicles that probably isn't really worth much; yet. Geoff Miller (Range Rover development team) says that it probably will increase in value considerably over the next few years but it will need to be looked after carefully. The exhibition of our vehicles at the museum is an added attraction to the museum's visitors and so we get in free. The museum collection is very impressive and is forever changing. Rover (and predecessors) vehicles predominate but there are a few other makes including a recently donated BMW from the late twenties which is basically a German built Austin Seven. From these humble beginnings. BMW grew to the size whereby it was able to buy the company that spawned it in the first place. The donation of this vehicle was in response to that purchase! A whole range of first and last from the production lines seems to be the main theme but many experimental and development types are on display in and around the main building.

Late afternoon we make the long haul (about 250 yards) over the road

to the camp site where a children's bike trial had been taking place. Barbecues were assembled and fired up by 19:30 (that's half past seven in English). The barbies are up to speed in minutes. The chap running them supplied the charcoal which he made himself. I've never met a real-life charcoal-burner before. There's always something new, isn't there? He showed us photos of how it's made. The old clay "clamps" aren't used much these days: he uses a huge steel multi-part conical affair which produces about a ton of charcoal at a time. Very impressive. The clamp comes apart to be taken to where the timber is. All he needs to do is to fire it up there in the woods; not forgetting to inform the local fire brigade that there will be clouds of smoke appearing for a couple of days while the charcoal cooks. His charcoal is much better than the stuff you buy in the shops. We all supplied our own food and it turned out very well. Chris Savidge's wife had made binfuls of cakes which was distributed free and hot water was supplied for members to make coffee or tea themselves. This actually works well, as bringing food and the makings of drink is very easy and saves members bringing cooking utensils along. The electric Burco water heater contrasted well with the adjacent barbecue! What a superb evening too.

Next morning the weather was fine and dry again so I packed up the tent and stowed everything in the back of the 101 and crossed the road again for the display area. The previous record for 101s together in one place stood at 28. Could we break this record? Yes, easily. More turned up on the Sunday compared to the previous day. Malcolm Whitbread brought his infamous Comp Safari 101 racer along and John Kaye drove up from Reading to add his to the line up. We got over 50 eventually. After a brief shower of rain in the morning, the sun reappeared and proceeded to cook everyone again! During the day we twice paraded the whole lot round the museum grounds for the entertainment of the public present. Bearing in mind that Gaydon is out in the middle of nowhere, the attendance by the public was quite good. Another children's bike trial took place on the grass in front of the museum during the day. About mid afternoon, there was an award ceremony for the best vehicle there, the farthest travelled. the bike trials winners and an assortment of other presentations to Rover vehicles of all types. The judges were museum staff and other quests, such as Norman Busby who led the 101 design team.

Just when we thought it was safe to go home, a photo shoot was called. All the 101s were then driven to a meadow on museum land and arranged so a photo could be taken of this record attendance on the 101's 21st birthday. The photographers were hoisted up on a 'cherry-picker', you know, one of those hinged-arm devices the council use to change street lamp bulbs. Try sitting on the ground and looking straight up at the sun shining over the shoulder of the photographer!

The trip home looked ominous but there was very little traffic so all in all a very successful and enjoyable weekend. It's possible that the date may be shifted next year so it doesn't clash with the West Wycombe 4x4 Show or be so close to the Billing event.

## Bagshot Off-Road Show 1996



### Sunday:-





### Battlehurst Farm Inter-Club RTV Trial

Bit of a disappointing turn-out for the Inter-Club Challenge at Battlehurst Farm, considering how close it is. Only seven HBRO members competed. The full details were a little delayed in coming from Southern but the event dates were listed on the events page for quite a while and there's always the phone numbers inside the front cover if anyone needed more details.

The generally poor attendance on the Saturday threatened the running of the Gymkhana but Paul Barton put one together and an assortment of vehicles took part.

On Saturday evening, the manager of the farm took us on a conducted tour of the farm, explaining the philosophy of running a mixture of a milk herd and arable farming. State of the art milking machinery and bulk storage was shown. We then went to visit the calves following by a field-trip (into real fields!) to meet the livestock. The farm manager uses a Land Rover of course. The 90 has a bull-bar and light guards all round as the cows eat the lights! A kind of green lane trip followed through the woods to various other areas of this huge property. We paused here and there on high ground to admire the lovely views of West Sussex. We stopped off for a while at Brian Bashall's owl rescue centre. Most of the youngsters (and some of the adults) had never seen owls at close quarters before. I must admit, I never realised just how big Snowy owls are, standing two feet tall and spanning over 5 feet. I've seen them in books and on TV but the reality is a revelation. The barbecues were fired up upon our return to the camp-site and we ate ourselves silly in preparation for the hard work on the following day. Well, that's my excuse anyway.

Battlehurst Farm is like a large scale Nelly's Dell, really. A few lumpy bits, some twists through the trees and a muddy stream provided adequate interesting terrain for an enjoyable trial. Far too much of it was full lock-to-lock for my liking and the gates were so narrow as to touch both sides of the vehicle at the same time at one point. Yes I know I have a wide vehicle by choice, but the gates should be to direct the vehicle to the appropriate area of difficult terrain, not to present a challenge in themselves. Southern make up their own trialling rules and, as with the National Rally, these odd variations were the only bits that spoiled the event for me. Basically, the shunt is intended to make passage through a trial section possible for LWB vehicles whilst leaving it challenging for the smaller vehicles. Under SROC rules, you have to declare, before you set off, the point at which you wish to

take the shunt. This is at variance with ARC rules and rather defeats the object of having the shunt. Similarly, they do not allow you to cross your tracks AT ANY POINT on a given section. This too is a quite pointless variation on the ARC Handbook stated process which merely prohibits you crossing your tracks between any pair of gates. I did point out all these matters to those present and if any Southern members read this, then I hope they'll treat it as constructive criticism and not a whinge. I wonder if they realise how many potential competitors they put off? "If you don't like the rules, then don't play the game" seems to be the principle.

Anyway, we put up a good fight (which is a polite way of saying that Southern retained the trophy!) Competing for and supporting HBRO were Ashley Pocock and family, Gary Hodgson and family, (these two double-driving Ashley's series One), Nick van den Braak and family, (very posh, nearly new 90) Nick and John Jennings, (90 - currently for sale), Clive Parker, (110), Steve Kirby (101) and Russel Vare (88"). In support were Roy Michael and Barry & Andrew Simpson with numerous friends. Apologies if I've missed anyone out.

### Looking Back - ARC EGM June 15th 1996

At the June EGM, Ian Davis of RACNISA promised to answer two questions which could not be answered at the meeting. These were:-

- (2) Why are only National B and higher graded RACMSA Scrutineers empowered to affix RACMSA helmet stickers, when all Scrutineers are empowered to check helmets at Scrutineering?
- A1 It is only those grades of Serntineer who are deemed to have the experience and training to 'sticker' helmets.
- (2) Can a driver (competitor) change vehicle in a competition when the entered vehicle has
- A2 Not without provision in the events Supplementary Regulations—Having reviewed the General Rules and Regulations the only way that this can be facilitated is for the entrant (driver) to nominate at signing-on a reserve vehicle. This is different to double driving per se, as the use of the reserve vehicle would only be as necessary. It is not permissible to change vehicles ad hoc, after signing-on. Once a compettor has retired, that is it, if they continue to compete after technically retiring they are no longer covered by insurance. For the reason above, this ad hoc practice must stop. I noted that the delegates seemed divided on the desirability of the practice, I believe that if clubs wish to permit this practice, then that is their choice, but they must do so in accordance with the above procedure, and I suggest the nominated reserve vehicle be in the same class as the vehicle entered.


## DUNSFOLD LAND ROVER TRUST OPEN WEEKEND, OCTOBER 5th & 6th.




## RTV & CCV Trial, September 29th. Hook End Farm, Upper Basildon, Pangbourne


