

- The eligible events will be all HBRO activities from December 1996 through to October 1997.

An award will be made at the AGM 1997, for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places. The nature of the awards will be announced following the 1996 AGM.

A new award the, "Performance Cup" for Class 4/10 - 90" Wheelbase competitors will be awarded at the 1997 AGM. The 90" wheelbase vehicles were sadly (violins) lacking a trophy and with their popularity as trials vehicles I felt their competitiveness needed recognition. The only rules are: No cheating, HBRO club events only, (the Nationals will not apply), and only Blue truck cabs are eligible. OK, all right other colours as well (it was worth a try Pam!).

The Rickshaw is on !! Please let me have your names for the Friday, or Saturday activities, and please not the new dates of 11/12 January. It is possible that help may also be needed on the Sunday 13, so if your interested let me know.

I thank you for your support over the last twelve months and I thank you for electing me for another twelve months. The last year has gone quickly, another year closer to retirement and quite what it holds in store is not very clear. Club funds now stand at £3250.00 and this is an increase of £1500.00 over the last year. This is in excess to the money spent on the two video and television systems for use at the two respective club nights. We have also stocked up with a god supply of door stickers, tee shirts and sweat shirts. This does not mean we have finished spending and need ideas on what the club needs. Present thoughts include a large tent for use on camping weekends, portable radios for use when trialling and petrol driven hand tools for use in clearing the sections. So if you have any other thoughts please let the committee know.

We have had a good year for raising funds from subscriptions, trials and fun days. Over the year the income was £11800.00 and we spent £10300.00 leaving and balance of £1500.00 towards the club funds. We have set a target of trying to add at least £1000.00 to funds each year such that by the year 2000 when we hope to try for an ARC National and we can fund the event without having to go into debt.

The magazine is still printed locally and by putting it to-gether ourselves we have continued to save on costs. The costs have risen slightly due to the increase in copies printed. Last year we were sending out 200 and this has now increased to almost 300. This is due to increase in membership and complimentary copies to other magazines and interested parties. I must thank Maxine and Peter Leverett for helping out with the distribution of the magazine. So the Editor is Steve (Forgetful) Kirby, I print the magazine and prepare the mailing list with the renewal letters and then Maxine staples, folds and mails the final item with any additional flyers that arrive at the last moment. We have dropped the colour front page as this almost doubles the final preparation stage as do the late flyers. We have had a few problems with the timing of the magazine which have all been down to me trying to fit it in with my own business and holidays.

We have had three good events this year which have resulted in an increase in membership with corresponding subscriptions. We have raised money towards the running costs of the North to South Run and a good cause nominated by the Range Rover register as a way of thanking them for their assistance in the fun days. In all we gave £600.00 to these causes.

Membership has increased and this has reversed the experience of the previous years when it fell. The increase is from 197 to 240 Ordinary Members and 74 to 94 for Associate members. This now gives us a total membership of 334 an increase of 63 over the year. This is the result of the Weavers Down fun day and two good Bagshot 4x4 Shows. Overall it has been a good year and we look forward to the coming year with new sites and new challenges.

ARC National Rally 1998/1999/2000/2001

It was proposed that HBRO consider making an application to run an ARC National Trials sometime in the near future. As my heading implies the year is very much in question as are many other points.

The recent AGM decided to first ask the membership how many members would be prepared to offer their services to help run such an event. We must stress that helping in the event will not prevent you from taking part in some of the events. We do not want to make the mistake of making a blanket ban on all HBRO members just because we maybe the host club. This help can be very diverse from setting out trial sections, to organising the caravan site, gate duty, refuse collection, entertainments officer, procurement manager and others.

We envisage a small committee to initiate the event and liaise with the respective authorities and generally manage the event. The big need for additional assistance would be in the week prior to and the week following the event. The largest demand would fall over the bank holiday weekend whilst the event was taking place.

At this stage we have informed the ARC of our possible interest and they would be pleased to receive an offer from a club in the South of England, since the next three years are all set to take place in the North of England. North Wales 1997, Lancashire 1998 and Yorkshire for 1999.

Main problems are:-

- 1. Can we get enough members to pledge their support.
- 2. Can HBRO afford to put on such an event.
- 3. Can we find a site suitable for the event.

The first problem is in your own hands so please write or call and give us your support or tell us otherwise.

As to the funding of the event I am confident this is possible and if set up right can be self funding. Big key to funding is the caravan content and this outshines any funds raised by the trial or trade participation.

As to the site we feel we can offer a good selection and with the funds available to such an event we could attract others. The ideal site should be somewhere in the Aldershot or Reading areas. Recent adverts have brought to light new sites.

Therefore before we can proceed any further please let us know if you will help us run such an event. Please make your feeling known as soon as possible.

Bagshot 4X4 Show 1996

The Bagshot 4x4 Off Road show has now been held for the last five years, with 1996 being the first time it was held in both April and September. The club gave a good account of itself with about 25 marshals who turned out for both days.

The show itself seems to grow in popularity with a good display from both trade and club interests. The course itself was laid out to give both the novice and experienced off roader something to enjoy. The only thing that did not come up to scratch was the weather, it was too nice, no pre-show drenchings which has set the scene for previous years. The conditions were such that the marshals had little to do but ensure the drivers were aware of the safety aspects of off road driving and control the pace at which they proceeded.

For my part the best part of the weekend was the setting up on the Friday, when a small group of volunteers prepared some of the Alpine sections. It is fun trying to make the sections more of a challenge without putting them at risk. When the setting out is completed it gives you the chance to drive all of the sections and at the same time looking out for sections which would could give problems, were the marshals would be best served and where directions arrows would be required. In reality the ground was very dry and on the whole the larger 4x4 vehicles would cope with ease. There was some concern for the smaller 4x4 vehicles which did not have the same engine braking control and tended to run away with themselves on some of the steeper sections.

Brian Frankland spent most of the day charging round in his bright blue roadster keeping us all on our toes. He did his best to ensure the marshals in the remote alpine regions were relieved. In my case he came close to lift off as I seemed to be on a hill which was by-passed by one of the off road sections. He sent out four or five reliefs who all failed to find me. For next year we will suggest fitting a cannon to his roll bar so he can blast a path through to me or to exterminate any marshals who ignore his pleas for help. Eventually our leader found me a good chance to make a break for it.

Maxine manned the club stand and gave a good account of herself with sales of shirts, magazines and enrolment of new members.

No decision has been made yet as to whether the April event will take place. A possible date is the 13th April and it would be a one day event should it go ahead. The September dates are 27/28th and this will be the normal two day event. So anyone who is interested in the possible April and September shows and who wants to marshal please let me know well in time. For those who do not want to marshal please do come along and help to make the show a worthwhile event. We are to be the lead club for 1997 so lets help to make it show to remember. Any ideas for the show would be welcome and we pass them onto the organisers for their consideration. We must thank Chris Jones for the donation to club funds, it is most welcome.

Please come along on Saturday to help lay out. On the Sunday, please enrol as a marshal once in a while, we'll show you how to score if vou've not done it before!


Finally, please don't all rush off at the end: those who add up the scores and deal with the paperwork need a bit of help. It's always the same few who do it. Thanks.



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
Rickshaw Ramble, Weaver's Down, 11th-13th January.

This event is run by the Army for members of the forces including the Police, Coastguards and members of the Civil Service Motoring Association. The event consists of several driving and navigational exercises over the weekend. The tests will include Safari, Scatter, Night Navigation and Off-Road trials driving course which is where our club comes in. We have again been asked to set out and marshal the observed sections around the course. Marshals are also needed for the other parts of the event.

HBRO members will be setting up the trials section on the Friday; marking and testing the sections. Anyone who wants to help must contact Ashley as soon as possible as he has to get passes sorted out. Entry will be via the main gate of Longmoor Camp and everyone on the site must have a vehicle pass and a personal pass. Overnight camping can be arranged. We may not be using the "track to site" shown on the map; but it's marked just in case.

As last year, we will meet for a briefing at the Longmoor Camp main gate at 8pm on Saturday. Don't worry if you've never marshalled before; training and guidance will be given. If you can't make it all day, still ring Ashley as he may be able to sort out late passes.

The competitors are timed, so the sections have to be designed so the participants won't get stuck as they have to make it to the finish of each section. They will be penalised 5 points for each stop or cane hit; these point being added to an accumulative score. We will have to time any stoppages or hold-ups so it can be deducted from their final times.



Bagshot Off Road Show

As I have recounted in the past on these pages James, my nephew, is the proud owner of a 101. He has been trying to tell me for some time how it is the ideal green road machine, the ideal RTV machine, and far better at everything than my 88!

The first off road event he did was at Bagshot about three years ago (he even got his photo in LRO) and at last the challenge was issued for this years event. As I was due in Bristol the following weekend I decided to make a week of it.

This increased the preparation considerably. It would involve leaving the Land Rover parked on the streets of both Portsmouth and Bristol, so it was time to sort out the door and window locks. Also, unlike the National Rally, when if I break something I can just call the AA to get me home, I had to be ready to repair it is necessary. In addition I could not risk needing a tow from the 101, so SATs would have to be the order of the day, but I didn't intend driving 800 miles on them. I eventually set off with the the Land Rover full with 5 SATs, a diff, a pair of half shafts, tools, and that was before I loaded for a weeks holiday!

I was a bit concerned as any public course cannot be too demanding, as one stuck vehicle can cause horrendous hold ups, as other organisers have found in the past. I was even told by one North Wales member that it was only the fact that in the confusion at the gate no one had taken any money from him that stopped him demanding a refund as the course was so tame! Hopefully it wouldn't be that bad, but I wasn't expecting it to tax a 101.

Sunday moming saw us heading from Dorking to Bagshot.

I was leading in with WOW in trialling mode, i.e. SATs, truck cab, open back and minimum of (secured) tools, with my other nephew William as navigator, James and friend in the lorry, totally open, with my brother John bring up the rear with his 110 County. He didn't intend using it, but had other things to do so needed to get home if we decided to stay all day. First stop then was the car park where we managed to cause total chaos whilst waiting for him to park.

Soon we were in the queue to get in, but having taken the precaution of booking ahead (and saving money into the bargain) I was waved to the front. As I drove in the first sight I saw was the Landcraft marquee, or to be more precise Dave Mitchell in his marquee. Is there any escape from this man? Unfortunately James had not prebooked so I had to pull over and wait for about twenty minutes while he queued, but soon I was following him onto the cross country course. First we were stopped by a marshal trying to establish the level of our skills.

"It's alright," says Clerk of the Course Steve Kirby, coming to my rescue, "I think he knows what he's doing."

You've not seen through me yet then Steve? We were advised to start with the Off Road Course and were soon entering a large deep puddle, well puddle is inadequate, pool perhaps. Not that deep, but enough to catch out the careless. I had intended doing things by the book and fitting the wading plug, but

it was all happening too fast, but I did manage to stop after the first splash to fit the standard Welsh farmers fertiliser sack over the grille. I know some felt it a bit over the top but I have had considerable problems with blocked radiators after past wading. There was another large pond then a number of ruts and humps before returning to the start.

Interesting, but hardly worth over £25. We went straight onto the Rough Road course. Oh Dear. To be fair it was described as being suitable for the 4x4 owner who had never driven off road before. If a Discovery (or even Vitara) owner found that course interesting, it is very sad. I suppose I may be a bit biased, after all my job involves delivering to farmers along far rougher tracks, in an Astra van!

And so it was onto the Alpine course and eventually we turned off into the trees. We were immediately stopped by a marshal and instructed to wait until the James had completed the descent in front of me.

"It's OK. I'll have to go and tow him out in a minute anyway." At that point the lorry stops dead by a tree and the reversing lights came on. Unfortunately he managed without my help.

What followed was a long meander through the trees in a situation that could easily be an RTV section. Back out onto the track and soon we were off along another section. These sections were very good. Whilst obviously there were no real problems for an 88 on SATs, it couldn't be driven on autopilot. Whilst there were a large number of Discoveries being driven round, I wouldn't have wanted to drive my boss's round, some (?most) of the trees were very close. Having said that the only damage I saw was to the lorry, James having managed to find another tree.

Time to look round the tradestands. James & William were both trying to convince their dad to buy more aggressive tyres for the 110. I'm not sure why, although languishing in the car park today it does accompany the lorry green roading from time to time, doing so effortlessly on its standard 7 50 Avon Rangemasters to the steadily increasing annoyance of both James and his mates with "better" shod vehicles.

Stop to talk to Steve on the way back to the motor, and at that point fellow Clerk of the Course Mick Doherty asks him to check on hold up and I'm offered a ride in the coiled 101. What an improvement! The hold up was near the military vehicle display, but had been sorted by the marshals on the spot so we were able to look at the vehicle there. For most Land Rover enthusiasts the star must be the Centaur, a half track conversion, but for me

it was the mine protection Bedford MK. A handful of RLs were built in the 60s, primarily for service in Aden, and in the 70s an MK version was developed for Oman. Two were made, one being destroyed in testing (the idea is to give the occupants a chance of surviving a mine blast, it is accepted the vehicle may not) but by then the war was over (thanks to the SAS, that was where the Pink Panthers became pink) so this vehicle remained unique.

By the time John & I had walked back, I don't know where Steve disappeared to, James had given up waiting and had set off on his own but

William had waited for us, and we set off round the Alpine course again. This time the first section had been temporarily closed and we discovered one of the subtleties of the course, some of the sections overlapped whilst others bypassed the more interesting, that is steeper, sections of the main track, meaning you couldn't experience everything in one pass.

Back onto the Cross Country course and again several alternative routes were tried. One near the end lead me into a big watersplash, then another, that I totally missed at the end first time round. Oh, no I didn't, I've managed to cut back across to the start again. It took three circuits before I found my way off and back onto the Alpine course.

During this time James was also enjoying himself, bending the lorry again and flooding it in the watersplash. In my absence he was rescued by a sympathetic fellow 101 driver. If I'd been there I would have dragged him all round the course. Whether my sleeve would foul the horn whilst doing do I've no idea!

So what did I think of the day? Very good, I enjoyed it immensely.

Would I go again? Well probably not if it involves driving 300 miles! For those living closer I recommend it for an enjoyable day out especially if, like me, you believe a good days off roading shouldn't need a rope.

Was it worth the money? It cost a bit (approaching 50%) more than other driving days I've attended. These have been off the "go through the gate and drive where you like" kind, which on the

right site can be very enjoyable (Landcraft's Bala site springs to mind) but many

people immediately look for someone else to follow.

This event I assume was run under an RAC Promotional Event permit. This calls for adequate marshalling and supervision, this has proved the stumbling block we have found when trying to organise Off Road Driving in the North Wales Land Rover Club. The high level of Marshalling, in which Hants & Berks Rover Owners members seemed to be playing a major role, was one of the features of Bagshot. It was a bit frustrating being told that on every circuit that the hill ahead was deeply rutted and to keep left (especially as I am convinced there was a better line to the right, at least on SATs) but at least this kept things moving and people out of trouble. As some of you will know a member of the public was killed at a "Play Day" earlier this year so I suspect then more tightly controlled events like this will be they way to go in the future.

All in all the event was a credit to all involved, many HBRO members, and may I take this opportunity to apologise to all those of you I didn't get an opportunity to talk to, and thank all of you who gave me such an enjoyable day.


