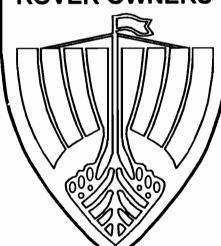

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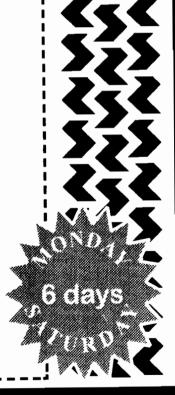

# The Internet & the HBRO Home Page - part 1

Some of you may have noticed that the club has its own page on the Internet. Some of you have visited and signed the guest book. Some of you will have had a look at the photos. Some of you will be saying, "what is he talking about".

The HBRO web site is being visited by people from all over the world, it is receiving acclaim from users of the net as one of the most forward looking and interesting Land Rover sites on the internet. It contains news, events, photos and club information. So how did it get there and how do you have a look at it, read on...

Now I know that the range of computer knowledge in the club ranges from "I can't even spell it" to "I've embedded a P2 processor in my head and program it while I'm asleep". So what I am going to do is start with the basics and progress to more complex stuff. This will enable you to 'tum off' when you like!

The Internet is a World-wide network of computers, which, with the right equipment, you can access from any computer with a modern. A computer can be anything from a Psion Organiser to the latest and baddest mainframe. The modern that you connect between your computer and the phone socket, preferably somebody else's so you don't have to pay the phone bill, transfers information between computers having first coded and decoded it.

Many of you will have the computer bit, usually 'cos "the kids need it for school".

To gain access to the Internet, you will need to do a couple more things. Get yourself the aforementioned hardware in the shape of a modern. They vary in a few ways, the type - Internal, External, PCMCIA (for portables), and of course speed. Internal means that you will have to take the lid off and install the modern into a spare slot on the motherboard. For those of you who don't know how to open the bonnet of your Land Rover, do not attempt this please. The External type just plugs into a spare socket on the back of the computer.

Once you have done the install bit, the computer has to install software to run the modern. This could be tricky. If you are running Windows 95, the operating system will usually guide you through this. Whatever you do, follow the instructions that come with your modern.

OK you've finally got the modem installed, or somebody else helped you, and you've faxed everybody you know with your new set-up.

So how do you get on the Internet? Nothing in this world is free so most of you will have to open an account with an Internet Service Provider (ISP). This account will allow you to get on the Web through your own computer. Costs do vary for this service anywhere between £5.00 & £15.00 per month. For this amount you will have your own e-mail address and personal web space, like the HBRO site. I would advise against companies like AOL and Compuserve, unless you have a specific need for the content that they provide. They tend to be slower. If you take a look at 'Internet' magazine, they give a breakdown on the

quality and speed of service of all of the main players in the ISP business.

It may all seem a bit too much, just to get on the Net, but it is worth it.

There are many friends etc who can guide you through the process.

Once you are set up you will have the following at your disposal.

- ACCESS to information on ANY subject from anywhere in the world.
- ACCESS to resources such as pictures, software etc.
- ON-LINE Shopping speaks for itself.
- NEWS GROUPS for you to join and put the world to rights.
- CHAT ROOMS so you can chat live on virtually any subject with other on line users.
- E-MAIL more and more people now use e-mail, it is cheaper than a stamp, and gets anywhere in the world within seconds.
- ALL of this and more for the cost of a local phone call.
- These are the CONS.
- Increased phone bill.
- Risk of getting addicted.
- Risk of boring your friends.

That will do for now, in a later article I will touch on how to find stuff on the web, and how to have your own web site.

I was early as usual but soon more turned up. Even so, we had only about three marshals for each section. I was directed to the lake as my 101 has more ground (or should that be water?) clearance than anyone else. I was with Trevor Jones (who had laid this section out) and Neil Shawyer. I drove through the water to see how deep it was and felt that I would be towing a few out during the day. The start of this section was a twisty climb over some banks and a zig-zag into the water. A surprising number didn't spot the offset gate in the shallows and lost points. The route through the water was reasonably straight but wide. The depth varied considerably depending on how near the bank you were. Logical really but few competitors worked this out unless they were deliberately aiming for deep water. (Why does JJ come to mind at this point?) The end was

up a steep incline with a concealed hard left turn to the last gate at the top. Again, many competitors missed it as their navigators couldn't count the gates. Most of them seemed to be there just for the ride and clearly weren't looking out for the gates.

water. It was clear that
some were putting on a
show and despite a few
coughs and splutters,

not a single one stalled in the water. There were undoubtedly a couple of wrecked engines as ominous clanking and clouds of smoke indicated. Just the sort of thing you would expect from people driving government-owned vehicles paid for by you and me!

The only non-Land Rovers were a Lada Cossack and a Vauxhall Frontera. Only one new-style Range Rover appeared and this had no trouble on

its road tyres. The traction control could be seen and heard in action as it climbed the wet sandy bank at the end of the lake. The highlight for me was to see the eagerly awaited Freelander in real off-road action. It was driven by a couple of Rover engineers. It sauntered through the water with no problem but failed to make the steep climb to the finish which was wet and cut up by this time. It was



a base model without tractioncontrol and to be fair, this isn't the kind of terrain it was intended for although it would have been interesting to see one with traction control on the same incline. Neil the towed Freelander up to the finish. Is he the first **HBRO** member to recover a Freelander? We had a good look at this vehicle later in

the day. It was a two-door short-body type (all Freelanders have the same wheelbase) with a folding rag-top at the back. Opening the bonnet revealed a strange sight. The engine is an unimpressive lump with the injection run by a black-box and not the normal fuel-pump / regulator that one normally expect to see on a diesel. I sat in it for a few seconds - Hmmm, not bad. The vehicle is a Land Rover factory trim-shop hack and had odd holes and odd wires around the dash. A request for a test drive was refused. It's well protected undemeath but I was dismayed to see drum brakes on the rear.

Once all the competitors had passed our section, we followed the competitors round the rest of the sections and had a go at them ourselves.

So the lake which was perceived as being the most likely cause of problems was tame compared with some of the other sections which became nigh-on impossible once a few dozen vehicles had chewed them up a bit! Once everyone had finished, we collected the canes and returned

to the RVP and loaded up the trailer, HBRO's main task being complete for another year.

One of these days I'll be fully up to speed and competing again - see you around...

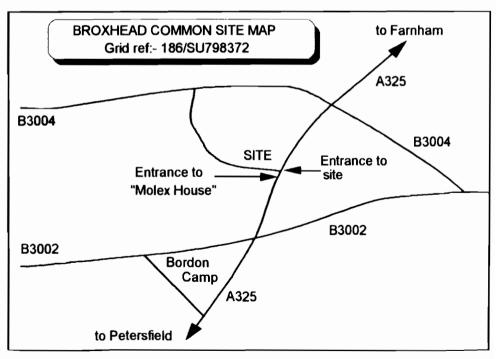

I have been asked by Alan Smith, to write a letter for The Pants & Barks concerning my experience or lack of it with wheels and tyres.

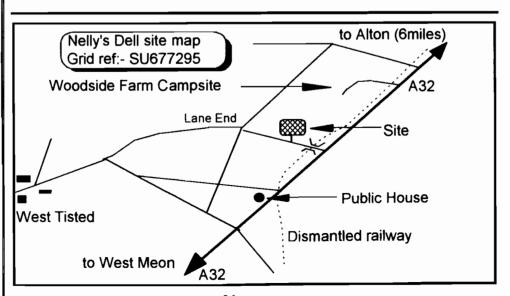

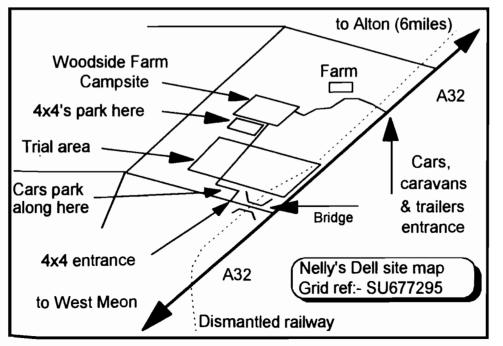
The events will be open to all members of HBRO. Trials entries should be on an official entry form. Entry is free.
